Pharaoh's Dreams

Today's story is found in Genesis 41:1-40

Please read this Bible story with your children. The questions you see below are the same ones we asked them in their small group time this week. (Don't worry he answers are included) Remember this isn't a test, but an invitation to conversation. Feel free to ask questions of your own. See if your children can retell the story.

After meeting the butler and the baker, Joseph stayed in prison for two more years. How do you think this made him feel?

How was Joseph able to leave prison?

God allowed him to interpret the dreams of the Pharaoh.

After God allowed Joseph to interpret the dreams, what did Joseph do next?

He gave Pharaoh the advice to save the grain of Egypt in order to save the people from the coming famine.

How did Joseph know enough to give advice to the Pharaoh?

Joseph had been in charge of both Potiphar's household and in charge of the other prisoners.

Did God make Joseph a slave?

No, his brothers did that.

Did God send Joseph to jail?

No, Potiphar's wife caused that.

How did God take care of Joseph during those things?

God allowed Joseph to become head of Potiphar's household.

In prison God allowed Joseph to meet the baker and the butler.

These things allowed Joseph to be in a place to interpret the dreams of the Pharaoh.
